

In recent years there have been intense political changes in voters preferences, party performance and political and social activism of citizens which affect the functioning of democracies in contemporary Europe, both East and West. Many (though not all) traditional mainstream Liberal, Social Democratic and Christ Democratic/Conservative parties have experienced a decline in their electoral performance. Voters have partly moved away from mainstream politics: election turnout and party membership have steadily declined, some of the voters withdrawing from politics, while others embracing different varieties of populist politics. New populist parties have emerged in some countries, while in others former mainstream conservative parties have shifted towards extremist populism. In some Western European countries (Austria, Denmark, France, Netherlands, Switzerland) right wing populist parties have become strong political competitors and have been able to heavily influence the political agenda. In some Eastern European countries right wing populist parties have seized the government (Hungary, Poland) and are rapidly transforming the political institutions and establishing various forms of "illiberal states". This all has affected the state of liberal democracies in West and East and caused deterrioration of democratic standards.

The aim of the conference is to explore the causes and consequences of these developments and reflect on the direction in which contemporary democracies are heading.

The conference language is English. Simultaneous interpretation will be provided in Croatian.
