



Analyses of export results in developed countries show that success is connected less with specialization and more with the general efficiency of the entire economy. Course Description

The course deals with the problem of economic prerequisites of democratization, which is a well-researched topic in comparative politics. Since the early 1960s there is an ongoing debate among political scientists on the relationship between economic development and establishing consolidated liberal democracies. A comparison of quantitative studies with large number of cases and qualitative historical studies with in-depth analysis of a small number of cases is given on the basis of Todd Landman's Issues and Methods in Comparative Politics.

Another focus of the course are problems and theories discussed in Ronald Inglehart's and Christian Welzel's book Modernization, Cultural Change and Democracy: the author's re-formulation of the modernization theory, the question how economic and social development affects value change and what is the link between modernization, value change and democratization. Finally, the question is raised about the origins and consequences of the financial and economic crises of 2008. A special emphasis is given to the problem of compatibility of capitalist economy, welfare state and democracy in Europe, based on analyses by Wolfgang Streeck and Claus Offe.



Course Description

The aim of this course is to offer a comparative study of electoral systems as one of the key areas of Comparative Politics and Political Science in general. Electoral systems are among the most important institutions in contemporary democracies. The most influential political scientists of our age have declare them "the most fundamental element of representative democracy" (Lijphart", "the most important part of the political system" (Sartori), but also potentially the most manipulated political tool (Taagepera and Shugart). In addition, Robert Dahl has pointed out that "probably no other political institution shapes the political landscape of a democratic country than its electoral system and its political parties". The purpose of this course is to equip students with fundamental knowledge about elections and electoral politics, and not just the institutional framework that sets the rules for the conducting of elections as such.



Course Description

The aim of the course is to introduce students to the basic features of the process of creation and implementation of EU policies, the content of these policies, and in general with the consequences of the process of Europeanization of public policy. The prerequisites of the course requires knowledge of the basic narrative of the policy analysis. In addition, it is partly linked to the standard literature on the political system and the political economy of the EU.

The course is divided into two parts. In the first part (meetings 1-6) are considered institutions, actors and processes related to the formulation and implementation of public policies of the EU, the concept of Europeanization as a broad framework for understanding transformation of EU public policies, EU budget and the mechanisms of coordination economic policies in the EU.

The second part of the course (meetings 7-11) discusses the specific policies created in the European Union, and the process of Europeanization of key public policies which are the exclusive competence of member states (education policy). In addition, on the basis of service learning methods, the course will analyze EU environmental frameworks and the level of harmonization between Croatian laws and practices, and EU legislation in the area of environmental policy.

In carrying out the first part of teaching was applied phase narrative of the process of creating a policy, based on an analysis of actors, goals and instruments of particular EU polices. The second part deals with all key EU policies, in addition to policies that are to a greater or lesser extent already covered by other courses to study political science (policy of the internal market and competition, trade policy, foreign and security policy, justice and home affairs). Each individual policy is discussed with regard to the role of the actors involved in its design, the instruments it uses and the objectives which it is achieved.

Based on the knowledge provided in this course, students can get a complete picture of the way in which takes place the policy making process of the EU, and a number of useful knowledge about the institutional and content features of individual policies. In addition, students receive basic knowledge about the achievements of the Europeanization of certain public policies, including those that still have the highest competence of the member governments.

Course Description

Foreign Policy Analysis (FPA) is a course offered to MA students of Politics. The main objective of the course isto enhanche knowledge of theories of foreign policy as well as the practice of making decisions in foreign policy. In the first part of the course we discuss relationship between public policies in general and FP. In addition, the emphasis is on issues of FP shaping, decision-making and implementation. The second part is focussed on various case-studies of FP. We deal with foreign policies of major countries, such as USA, Russia, China, UK, France, Germany, Spain, Italy, Poland, Iran, India, Japan. The approach combines historical and contemporary aspects of their FP. In the third part of the course, we focus on small states in the Western Balkans, as well as on Croatian FP. The course combines lectures and seminars. Active participation of all students is requested in order to achieve interaction and productive discussion in seminars. At the end of the course we hope students will be able to conceptualise and write at least a simple FP analysis of a particular country's foreign policy.

Course Description

The main goal of the course is to shed light on the key theoretical discussions and research ventures of feminist political science as well as its main preoccupations and contributions.

The course is divided into two distinctive parts. The first examines the development of feminism as a movement and theory and the ways in which it influenced real political change as well as the ways in which it challenged established concepts of political science. Feminism not only criticized the existing paradigms but also generated its own research methods through internal development, introduced issues as research foci and created new concepts - such as the private / public distinction, gender, patriarchy, reproductive work, intersectionality. etc.

After a general and historical overview, the second part of the course discusses key political and political science phenomena from a gendered perspective. These are selected based on their importance, for political science and feminist political science alike. It is these concepts that are the focus of an exceptional number of papers and research that have become increasingly comparative in nature in recent decades. Indeed, it can be argued that feminist empirical political science has experienced its comparative turn. Therefore, the primary focus of these issues will be comparative - although a comparison with Croatian circumstances and the Croatian political system will not be ruled out.

Course Description

The objective of this course is to introduce students to the phenomenon of the image as a central object of the interest in managing public relations and to bring them closer to the processes of creating brands, which presents one of the most demanding fields in this profession. Beside the knowledge of public relations, the course also makes possible for the students to understand basic knowledge of marketing, or promotion. Information and cyber security

Course Description

The objectives of the course are multidimensional and focused on the analysis of the cyber space, information and cyber security, and the actions of various actors.


The cyber space represents an open virtual world of information and communication systems that lacks borders or a unique jurisdiction of a specific state or organization over it. It is a non-physical space composed of information and communication technologies and systems accessed via computer networks. This space is utilized by numerous actors who have the ability to influence each other, as well as the technologies and systems of other actors. The cyber space is in constant horizontal and vertical expansion, enabling the creation of new services and jobs, which positively contributes to overall human development. On the other hand, it poses an increasing challenge due to actions and procedures by individuals, groups, and even states that threaten individual, organizational, public, national, and international security. Therefore, it is essential to develop and raise awareness of the importance of information and cyber security at all levels.

Under the concept of cyber security, we consider: a) the application of various technologies, processes, and controls as prescribed by competent institutions; b) information security; c) protection against cyber offenses of any kind. The concept of information security encompasses the state of confidentiality, integrity, and availability of data, where data is protected through the application of various measures and standards of information security.

Thus, the protection of information and business processes in the cyber space is a key priority for owners and managers of these processes, as well as for all states and international organizations such as the European Union and NATO. Many key processes are already taking place in the cyber space, as will be the case with an increasing number of future processes. For this reason, cyber security is becoming increasingly significant for numerous actors. Cyber security is an integral part of public, national, and international security, and due to its specificities and the expanding space it occupies, it needs to be analyzed and taught within a separate course.

Students in this course will be familiarized with the most significant international, state, and organizational aspects of information and cyber security, normative solutions, forms of threats, and models for implementing information and cyber security and achieving protection, as well as the main academic directions and research trends in this field.



Course Description

The aim of this course is to enable students to get acquainted with the practice and theory of interest representation and lobbying in the European Union. In addition to introducing students with main theories and relevant research in the field of interest group politics, the course will offer the opportunity for improving understanding of various factors affecting the patterns of strategic behaviour or interest groups and differences in interest representation between organizational types, issues and countries.

Besides, students will be able to explore the channels and techniques of influence of interest groups at various stages of the EU decision-making process. Moreover, throughout this course, students will be able to practice their argumentative and critical thinking skills through debates, role play, as well as development and presentation of individual projects related to self-researched hot EU policy issues. Finally, a more advance practical insights into the diversity of the EU interest groups scene and approaches to lobbying, as well as into the effectiveness of different influence seeking methods, will be made possible through (online) meetings/ discussions with experienced lobbyists, as well as speakers from the EU institutions.

Course Description

The objective of this course is to acquaint students with the methods of investigative journalism in the contemporary digital media environment. Through practical written/multimedia/television work (according to personal preference) on a proposed topic, students will engage in the investigative process, acquiring techniques for collecting and critically analyzing data and information from diverse sources. They will verify the accuracy and authenticity of these data and information, adhering to ethical rules and recommendations. Students will develop skills in identifying topics of public interest, particularly socially undesirable phenomena such as information cover-ups, corruption, and discrimination. They will utilize legal opportunities regarding the right to access information, become familiar with significant open databases, and grasp the basics of using and processing open data. 

The aim of this course is to elaborate some of processes and explain the role of Latin America in the contemporary world. The region as a whole and its relevancy in international community will be handled. 

Course Description

We have entered the urban age - most of the world population now lives in cities, which means we live in spaces managed and negotiated via the use of an array of communication technologies and practices.

In what is a rapidly growing field in media and cultural studies, the concoction "media city" cannot satisfactorily examine the dual object of its study from a single perspective (neither urban studies nor media studies alone), but requires select inputs from a range of disciplines (politics, media studies, urban studies, human geography, sociology of everyday life, sociology of media consumption, cultural studies, and architecture). Adopting this inter-disciplinary frame, in this course we examine how contemporary urban spaces manifest themselves as "mediated cities", and why it is useful to understand a wide array of media and communications in their formative urban context, such as:

- reading city spaces (plans, layouts, street furniture, monuments) as symbol and text;
- understanding urban infrastructures such as squares as media (and vice-versa):
- the rise of transnational cultures and social disparities in global cities;
- urban and suburban media cultures: newspapers, cinema, radio, television and the mobile phone;
- changing spaces and practices of urban consumption (the storefront, the mall);
- the mediation of the neighbourhood, community and diaspora;
- the centrality of politics and culture to urban regeneration;
- communicative responses to urban crises such as racism, poverty and pollution;
- the role of street art, graffiti and performance in the negotiation of 'the right to the city';

Students are required to attend one-hour lectures, followed by one-hour small group seminars (the student qualifies for the examination by having between not more than four absences), and, in preparation for the seminar, to read the text(s) set for each weeks session (available in advance through the library and online learning resources) and to think of ways of engaging with those texts with reference to empirical cases of their choice, so as to discuss and examine the pertinent issues. In all aspects of work on this course, students will be encouraged to act creatively and critically in reflecting on the postmodern urban spaces they inhabit, drawing on arts, graffiti, films, music, public events, and other particular forms of mediations. Students will be obliged to prepare, in advance of each weeks session, individual and/or group presentations of weekly readings thinking through the main points, as well as examples useful in an examination of the text. Students are invited to refer to cases identified in (as well as own produced work in,

- city competition and urban branding;
- outdoor advertising;
- changing forms of urban experience: indifference, encounter, flaneuring, street life;
- moving image architecture;
- the transformation of private/public as well as global/local in the contemporary city;
- 'smart'/cyber urbanism;
- the emergence of Media City production spaces and clusters.

You will gain access to some useful intellectual tools for understanding mediated urban life and you will develop an informed and critical understanding of what it means to live in the contemporary city. You will be expected to investigate mediated urban living creatively and critically, through a range of cross-disciplinary association, combined and unconventional methodology (paying attention to historical links and materiality of communication) as well as developing your own interest in the more specific issues and phenomena.

where appropriate and applicable) photography, film, and everyday urban spaces. Students will be encouraged to embark on their own explorations of the city, its spaces, objects, and mediations, to critically reflect on their experiences of everyday life in a technologically mediated city, and to seek out most useful ways of understanding and researching issues arising from those explorations. In the middle of the term students will be asked to submit a 2000 word long coursework, on a case of urban mediation of their own choice, with reference to one of the approaches covered in the course so far. Students are encouraged to do so, especially because they will be allowed to use the same material in their final examined work, and can thus seek appropriate feedback well in advance of the final deadline. The examined essay should be written in an intelligible academic English and in an engaging way (intellectually, empirically and conceptually), in 4-5000 words (bibliography included). The examined essay questions will be supplied during the term. Students will have plenty of opportunity to prepare for the examination, by attending individual tutorials with the course leader and interacting with one another in extra sessions like urban walks (see below).








Course Description

The course aims to familiarize students with qualitative and quantitative research methods most commonly used in the study of media audiences and to prepare students for the practical application of a chosen method on a specific example. The teaching is conducted in the form of lectures and seminars, during which students will additionally work on applying theoretical and epistemological assumptions to a concrete research problem. Seminar classes follow lectures and prepare students for the practical application of a particular method. Under the guidance of the course instructor, students will independently conduct research and write a research report. Students will gain insight into the epistemological and ontological foundations of research, ethical aspects in the social sciences, and research design. They will become familiar with the stages of the research process, which include drafting a research plan, reviewing the literature, developing a theoretical and conceptual framework, operationalizing concepts, formulating research questions, selecting an appropriate research method, sampling, data collection, data analysis and interpretation, and linking research results with theory.

Course Description

The objective of the course is to acquaint the student with the interaction of Jews and Arabs in the Middle East from the time of the First Aliyah (Jewish immigration to Palestine) and the birth of Zionism as organized political movement until today. Arab-Jewish relations will be discussed within different political contexts: late Ottoman Period, Mandate Period, State of Israel 1948-1967, State of Israel from 1967-1993, and State of Israel 1993 – present. Though focus is on the Eretz Israel, other Middle Eastern countries with Jewish presence prior to creation of Jewish State will be discussed, in particular Jordan, Syria, Lebanon, Iraq and Egypt. The course will address interaction between Jews and Arabs in broad variety: from peaceful coexistence to different forms of collision and conflict. The course is interdisciplinary in its approach. Political processes will be analyzed inter alia from the aspects of history, theology, nationalism, economy, ideology, and security.

Course Description

Even though political behavior draws its roots earlier in the past, it established itself within political science during the 1940s. Following the progress of quantitative methodology, researchers in this field helped in understading the ways citizens think about politics, make political decisions, develop political preferences, participate etc. However, the field cannot be reduced to quantitative approaches to voting behavior. It includes, among other things, researching political elites, various groups and political movements; political violence, traumatic events, political culture and media; and uses of various methodological tools, such as decision-making tracijng processes, indepth interviews, intepretative approaches etc.

Keeping all of this in mind, this course has two goals. First, students will become acquainted with the classical approaches and findings of political behavior. Through the sociological, socio-psychological and rational-choice approach the topics of voting, political values, ideology, political participation and others will be analysed. Second, students will become acquainted with newer approaches and topics within the field, sucha as emotions in politics, behavior of political elites, on-line political behavior, cultural processes etc. When they finish the course, students will be able to apply various theoretical frames, as well as methodological and analytical tools in studying the behavior of political actors.







The aim of the course is to introduce students to the fundamental categories, analytical models and research that have developed over the past two decades within the field of comparative politics that focuses on political parties—their emergence, development and functioning. Course Description

The title of the course "Political science fiction" is a wordplay: it means merging political science with fiction, or politics with science fiction. Science fiction provides the story or us, not predominantly or necessarily about outer space or distant future. Hence, science fiction can be seen as an allegory of ourselves and the opportunity to explore our political practices and society. The advantage of studying fiction along with social sciences, especially with politics, is the fact that fiction raises new ideas about politics that cannot be found in the mainstream social science literature. The creativity of thought found in science fiction thus helps us thinking about major politicalphilosophical problems we are always confronted with. The aim of this course is to examine some of the major topics in political science through the vehicle of (science) fiction narratives. We will provide these narratives with political aura giving them theoretical underpinnings. From its beginnings it is believed that science fiction represents a rich subtext for our historical and current political struggles. It deals with central political and social issues regarding our views on life in general and communal life with others, on threats to our way of life, on crossing the boundaries of traditions and existing social practices, on our enemies and human nature, on political and ethical disputes, ideal institutions, or utopian and dystopian political communities and organizations. Thus, science fiction contributes toward better understanding of political life. It is a divergent way of approaching to the grand themes of political science and social life in general. By merging politics and science fiction together this course will add to the traditional cannon of courses in political science, hence providing with the opportunity for learning about politics from the perspective of science fiction as an important part of our popular culture. Since science fiction provides a commentary on social and political evolution, it necessary resonates with current or potential problems and debates of this world. Sometimes science fiction is a product of both trans-epochal and current social problems and concerns. But our political ideals may be influenced by some idealized fictional views of the future. Hence, this course is designed to enliven a greater understanding of the seriousness of such views and debates by demanding from students to challenge their view on the genre, namely to see beyond the entertaining dimension of science fiction, but rather into its political and social potential for critique of our societies, institutions, dangers and development. As such, it is a course about politics and political thought, not (science) fiction as such. Since the relevance of political-philosophical arguments in fiction should not be explored exclusively in the genre of sci-fi media, the course is a platform to explore the politics through film in general. In doing so, we will focus on different sources - from the politicalphilosophical texts to those that explore the matter in question through the lenses of international relations, comparative politics and public policy - asking from the students the ability to think in different directions.

Course Description

This course is about political and social processes in Southeast Europe, defined in a wider sense which includes Turkey, Greece, Albania and post-Yugoslav states. Course Description

A main purpose of the course is to equip students with skills to approach study of the Middle East with methods of research focused on distinctive cultural, social and political features of the Orient.

This graduate course is focused on politics, religion and history of the Middle East, and the sources for their study. Inasmuch as most students attending this course have never studied Middle East, course starts with introduction to basic information about it. (No previous knowledge about Middle East is expected from students enrolling to this course).

There are several aspects in which Middle East differs from Europe and the West. One of those aspects is significant role of religion and irrational thinking in defining political positions and creating political programs. Another is role of history - particularly if history is perceived as containing divine revelation - in finding political patterns and parallels in modernity. Religion and the past are among the main sources of identity and loyalty in many Middle Eastern societies. Transmission of their importance into politics is not an unexpected phenomenon, and yet it has often been overlooked and neglected in many European and Western analyses of the Middle East. This has been done partially due to want of methodological tools to examine it. context, importance of an interdisciplinary multidisciplinary approach ad hoc designed for study of Oriental societies cannot be overrated. This course has been designed to investigate correlation of different academic disciplines in Oriental studies, primarily Political Science, Theology, History, Linguistics and Law. For the purpose of following those processes, sample historical and current events will be discussed.

Students will also be introduced to some basic Hebrew and Arabic terms, necessary to understand current Middle Eastern Processes. Emphasis is on terminology relevant for studying politics of the Middle East, which cannot be translated into English without due explanation, such as Hitnahalut, Asabiyah, Caliphate, Fitnah, etc.

Invoking religion, and even history as a theological concept, in creating politics, is not unknown in the West. However, it has not been a dominant feature of Western politics for decades or even centuries. To study politics in the current Middle East, one ought to recognize its particularities, i.e. when it is similar and when it differs from Western politics, policymaking and legislation. Shift from a typical Western-oriented pattern of thinking, towards examination determined by features of the object of analysis is necessary to achieve such a goal. In the process, the student will gain insight into specific features and premises of different civilizations, which compels diverse approach in the study of various civilizations. The course will also raise awareness of Occidental-centeredness which often taints Western analyses of non-Western countries, societies, political cultures, religions and civilizations.

Zenzerović Course Description

The aim of this course is to introduce students to media text research methods in a wide range from quantitative methods, such as content analysis, to qualitative methods such as discourse analysis or narrative analysis. After lectures, students will attend practical workshops in which they will learn how to apply the methods they've learned about. Students will have the opportunity to independently draft a research, make an analysis of a particular sample of media text and interpret the results. In this course, students will gain insight into the range of research methods used in media text research, and the main goal of the course is to teach them how to apply these methods, how to read and interpret media text analyzes and, finally, how to critically evaluate their own research.

Course Description

The goal of the course is to provide students with systematic knowledge about the development of the discipline of mass communication, particularly in the context of the relationship between media, individuals, and society. The expected learning outcome is that students will master the fundamental elements of theoretical understanding and critical reflection, as well as gain insight into early and contemporary research on mass media and mass communication.

by adding the points earned through seminar work and the two mandatory midterm exams / final exam.

The lectures will cover various authors and scientific theories on mass media and mass communication, providing students with knowledge of different approaches to the analysis of mass media, as well as of the findings of the most well-known studies that have contributed to the development of the discipline of mass communication. The course specifically focuses on research and theories of media effects, that is, theories related to various assumptions and associated research on how the media influence individuals, social institutions, and society as a whole.

In the 2025/2026 academic year, each lecture session will cover a new topic, beginning with an overview of the historical development of media effects research worldwide - specifically in the United States, where this empirical communication science tradition originated - and the development of the communication discipline in Croatia. The overview of media effects theories will further map the broad and diverse disciplinary landscape in its historical evolution. After these introductory lectures, the course will focus on the analysis of key areas in which media effects have been studied and the related theoretical approaches, beginning with politics and journalism. It will cover the theories of agenda setting, the spiral of silence, framing, and priming. The course will also examine media influence in dramatic or other non-informational content, the cultivation theory, and media stereotypes. Particular attention will be given to theories of how individuals acquire knowledge from media content, as well as to different approaches to studying persuasion, including rational and emotional effects. The course will also address theories of selective exposure and media choice by audiences, as well as theories concerning the positive impacts of media.

In seminar sessions, students will engage with entire books by three key authors who explore the influence of media technologies on society – from radio and television to the internet and social media. These are Marshall McLuhan, Joshua Meyrowitz, and Manuel Castells. Students will read the assigned seminar literature weekly and discuss it during seminar meetings.

Course Description

The current technological and communication changes introduced by the popularization of social platforms have completely changed the way media content is created and distributed. Research shows (Reuters Digital News Report 2015) that users are accustomed to shorter media forms, to being informed via smartphones, and to increasingly using social media as a source of information. The growing popularization of social media has spawned content that is engaging and visual, and most importantly, divisible on digital platforms and that can achieve global reach in a short period of time. In this context, we are talking about media content that is going viral. Through interesting, engaging and creative infographics, memes, surveys, short videos, etc., media content no longer follows traditional media logic or traditional mode of distribution. Therefore, the aim of the course is primarily to acquaint students with the latest communication trends and practices, and then with new forms of communication that are characteristic of new media. This implies a (both technological knowledge of new trends communication) and skillful adaptation to the rapidly changing platforms, communication networks, user needs and behaviors, but also new forms of media content. Through the course, students will be trained in new forms of media content: how to create them, how to manage them and how to direct them in a new media environment.
