



American Foreign Policy


Course Description

The course objective is to introduce students to the actors, processes and institutions involved in creating US Foreign Policy. International sources of US foreign policy, international relations and foreign policy models, as well as complex bureaucratic processes and their interdependence are analyzed. The role of the President and Congress in the creation of foreign policy is studied, as well as the role of bureaucracy, the impact that individualss, the media, the domestic public, the military and the intelligence have had in foreign policy decision making. The course aims to identify themes, processes and patterns of US foreign policy from the late 19th to early 21st century; analyze processes, dynamics and elections in foreign policy decisions in the USA, use case studies to apply critical, conceptual and theoretical tools in assessing processes in US foreign policy, and enable students to think critically and to analytically approach issues. Students are expected to develop the ability of critical thinking and normative assessment of political institutions, processes and content of US foreign policy. There are questions as to why the US foreign policy makers have chosen a certain direction of action? What were the effects of such policies on the United States and the international system? How were American foreign policy doctrines shaped? How did US foreign policy change from the 19th to 21st Century?

By combining practical and theoretical knowledge students are able to analyse American foreign policy from the perspective of methods, techniques and resources. On seminars students apply adopted theoretical knowledge by simulating bilateral and multilateral negotiations related to the creation and implementation of the US foreign policy (such as a session of the National Security Council or UN Security Council meeting), and presenting US foreign policy decisions in contemporary international circumstances. Within the course, students are working on a research project aimed at presenting the mandates of 18 US Presidents through a critical analysis of three components: pre-election campaigns and elections; State of the nation speeches and inaugural speech, as well as the foreign policy strategy towards the key world regions (Middle East, Asia and Pacific, Europe, Latin America). This enables independent understanding of all levels, processes and actors involved in the foreign policy making.







Course Description

The course deals with the problem of economic prerequisites of democratization, which is a well-researched topic in comparative politics. Since the early 1960s there is an ongoing debate among political scientists on the relationship between economic development and establishing consolidated liberal democracies. A comparison of quantitative studies with large number of cases and qualitative historical studies with in-depth analysis of a small number of cases is given on the basis of Todd Landman's Issues and Methods in Comparative Politics.

Another focus of the course are problems and theories discussed in Ronald Inglehart's and Christian Welzel's book Modernization, Cultural Change and Democracy: the author's re-formulation of the modernization theory, the question how economic and social development affects value change and what is the link between modernization, value change and democratization. Finally, the question is raised about the origins and consequences of the financial and economic crises of 2008. A special emphasis is given to the problem of compatibility of capitalist economy, welfare state and democracy in Europe, based on analyses by Wolfgang Streeck and Claus Offe.

Course Description

The objective of the course is to introduce students to key aspects of the economic history of Croatia and to enable them to analyse development phases from the 19th century to contemporary Croatia. The conceptual framework of the course is supplied largely by growth model literature, and the focus is on identifying the determinants of growth in selected historical periods. Special attention in identifying the determinants of growth is paid to the role of international economic relations, and in particular the use of available data on the impact of international trade. Crisis periods can result in changes in growth models, and political science students can use the previously acquired knowledge and skills to identify crisis-driven changes in power relations and the results of these changes in key elements of the growth model, especially through key issues such as industrialisation, urbanisation, the role of exports, nationalisation, the role of trade unions, the role of capital owners and financialisation, privatisation, technological shocks and recessions. The methodology emphasises individual research given the availability of data. Research questions are offered that will be raised during the course, and students are encouraged to work individually in answering them. After a common categorical framework is formulated in the course, the search for additional sources and the interpretation of results within that framework are particularly valued. The course utilizes continuous student assessment throughout the semester. The grade is based on two midterm exams (an alternative to midterm exams is the full exam) and a positively graded group project or individual work. Activity and attendance in class are also taken into account.

Course Description

The objectives of this course are to facilitate students' linguistic progress and to enhance their overall linguistic competence as independent users of English according to the Common European Framework for Languages (CEF), in terms of both spoken and written production, regardless of the individual level the student has reached upon completion of secondary education. The foregoing is achieved by presenting thematic content in the form of scientific and theoretical discipline-specific texts, as well as by using diverse authentic and current events-based materials from different (written and oral) media, didactically adjusted with a view to facilitating the development of the four basic language skills (reading, listening, writing and speaking) and to acquiring and expanding specific professional vocabulary and morphosyntactic structures pertinent to English for Specific Purposes (ESP) in the field of journalism. By developing the receptive language skills, namely reading and listening, students are expected to acquire instruments for attending classes held in English, for using professional literature and for understanding oral discourse in the field of journalism. Furthermore, certain requirements laid down on students, such as delivering oral presentations, participation in class discussions and writing short essay answers, are supposed to lead to an experiential development of learners' productive language skills, i.e. speaking and writing, with an eye to providing them with the foundations for further active participation in classes held in the English language throughout their university studies.

Course Description

The objective of this course is further consolidation of linguistic competence of students as independent users of English and their progress on the scale of the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages (CEF). Presenting and teaching subject specific vocabulary continues on the basis of textbook disciplinespecific texts and a variety of authentic materials from both the written and spoken media. Constant exposure to diverse authentic source-materials throughout the semester should contribute to students' abilities: to understand most of television, radio and new media news, to attend discipline-specific lectures held in English by taking notes and to grasp at least a global meaning of professional English texts on journalism. Progress in terms of students' development of productive language skills, namely speaking and writing, as compared to the level they reached after the first semester, should be reflected in more structured oral expression, specifically the learners' more autonomous and spontaneous use of syntactic patterns typical of oral presentations and their mastery of syntactic structures needed for effective and linguistically accurate interviewing in English, as well as in more accurate and coherent writing (e.g. using appropriate vocabulary and morphosyntactic structures typical of journalistic discourse in English).

The aim of the course English for Political Scientists 3 is to establish and expand vocabulary - general and specialized in the field of political science - and to strengthen language competences with the systematic acquisition of important grammatical structures of the English language and progress on the scale of the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages (CEFR).

In addition to practicing basic language skills and intensifying work on acquiring professional terminology, at this level of teaching skills are also developed in translating and analyzing short professional and original journalistic texts from the British and North American press (newspapers and online portals) and voice shows (podcasts).

Students are introduced to the characteristics of political systems and cultural characteristics of countries where English is natively spoken, with a focus on the USA.

The focus is on students' progress in orally presenting original journalistic content in English about political life in the USA. Through oral presentations, students will, among other things, understand the basic tenets of political news, understand how the actions of individual political institutions are reflected in political journalism, and encourage colleagues to discuss the presented content.

The ultimate goal of the course English for Political Scientists 3 is the acquisition of new language structures in spoken and written expression in English, with an emphasis on topics from political science.

The aim of the course English for Political Scientists 4 is to consolidate language skills and enrich the vocabulary of the English language in the field of political science through the prism of the European Union, resulting in progress on the scale of the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages (CEFR). In addition to practicing basic language skills and intensifying work on the acquisition of professional terminology through lectures on the political system of the European Union, this level of teaching also develops skills in translating and analyzing short professional and original journalistic texts from the British and North American press (newspapers and online portals) and podcasts. The focus is on students' progress in oral presentation of original journalistic texts dedicated to European politics - both at the level of the European Union and at the level of the member states. Through oral presentations, students will, among other things, become familiar with the specifics of the European political situation, understand how the activities of individual political institutions are reflected in political journalism, and encourage colleagues to discuss the presented content.

The ultimate goal of the course English for Political Scientists 4 is the acquisition of new language structures in spoken and written expression in English, with an emphasis on topics from political science. Progress in the development of productive language skills (spoken and written expression) compared to their state at the end of the previous semester should be reflected in more structured oral expression (confident and more spontaneous use of syntactic expressions typical of oral presentations) and more coherent written expression (use of appropriate connectives inherent in the formal register necessary for stylistically adequate academic writing).





Course Description

The aim of this course is to introduce students to the theoretical features of newspaper forms and practical ways of writing. Writing for the media is strictly categorical, or necessarily obtains a certain form, although this form is by nature arbitrary. Forms of newspaper expression change through history, creating new and old ones; furthermore, not every form of reporting is appropriate for each event, but should be carefully selected; in the end, media forms depend on the media and technical conditions. The structure of this course is formed at the intersection of these factors, and also with the awareness that there are courses that deepen certain forms of news (interview, research journalism), linguistic problems of functional linguistic or the technical characteristics of new media.

It is assumed that the participants already know what the news are, what conditions the event must meet to be considered a news, where and how the news can be found and what kinds of news there are - so this is briefly repeated at the beginning, recapitulating the theory and practice of composing news, both on the structural and the linguistic aspect. Students will be thaught news forms that inform, expose and register (chronicle, report, report, poll, advertisement, obituary, horoscope, disease history); further in the course will be explained texts that encourage, direct or advise (activist texts, recipes, medical and nutrition advice) and texts that express an attitude, establish and maintain contact (pamphlets, panegirics, commentaries and jokes). The course will deal with the intertextual relationship of newspaper forms and titles and the intermediate relationship between newspaper articles and their illustrations (photography, caricature, chart).



Course Description

The main goal of the course is to shed light on the key theoretical discussions and research ventures of feminist political science as well as its main preoccupations and contributions.

The course is divided into two distinctive parts. The first examines the development of feminism as a movement and theory and the ways in which it influenced real political change as well as the ways in which it challenged established concepts of political science. Feminism not only criticized the existing paradigms but also generated its own research methods through internal development, introduced issues as research foci and created new concepts - such as the private / public distinction, gender, patriarchy, reproductive work, intersectionality. etc.

After a general and historical overview, the second part of the course discusses key political and political science phenomena from a gendered perspective. These are selected based on their importance, for political science and feminist political science alike. It is these concepts that are the focus of an exceptional number of papers and research that have become increasingly comparative in nature in recent decades. Indeed, it can be argued that feminist empirical political science has experienced its comparative turn. Therefore, the primary focus of these issues will be comparative - although a comparison with Croatian circumstances and the Croatian political system will not be ruled out.

Course Description

The aim of the course is to familiarize students with the theoretical and empirical dimensions of the structure and dynamics of contemporary media systems. The lectures will be organized into two main units, each addressing the fundamental concepts and social processes that define the media and media systems.

by adding the points earned through seminar work and the two mandatory midterm exams / final exam.

In the introductory unit, we will define the media as a social institution whose operation transforms relationships among members of society. We will discuss the media as technology, as a social organization/institution, as content, and as audiences. We will define the basic characteristics of different media – film, books, the music industry, the press and magazine industry, radio, television, and new media; the similarities and differences between mass media and other forms of communication, the characteristics of today's networked media, the developmental cycles of media, and their varying roles and impacts in society. In the 2024/2025 academic year, seminar sessions will be entirely devoted to an in-depth analysis of selected topics covered in the lectures through the discussion of targeted readings.

The second unit will analyze media systems across four key dimensions: 1.) Media markets (the economic conditions of their emergence and development); 2.) Political parallelism (the relationship between media and political elites); 3.) Media and the state (the nature and extent of state influence within the media system); and 4.) Professionalization of media occupations (the development of journalism and other media professions). The course will examine the influence of the political system on the development of media system models, comparing the relationship between media and the state/political sphere in totalitarian, authoritarian, and democratic systems, as well as in unconsolidated democracies. We will analyze the importance of freedom of expression and the role of the media in various democratic models, including ensuring citizens' informed consent to governance, holding power to account, and fostering democratic culture - tolerance, openness, public dialogue, mediation, and the creation of the public sphere, public opinion, and civil society. The course will also cover normative media theories related to types of media systems. Economic processes represent another key societal foundation for the development of media as an industry, and thus of media systems as a whole. The role of media ownership in democratic societies often has a more significant impact on the development of media systems than the role of the state. We will analyze the economic aspects of media organization, definitions and forms of media markets, and the relationship between media concentration and media pluralism.

Finally, we will analyze the Croatian media system through three phases: 1.) The development of media-state relations in the 1990s during the transition period; 2.) Changes following the beginning of democratic consolidation, the opening of the media market, and adaptation to European integration; and 3.) Analysis through the Hallin and Mancini (2004) model. In this academic year, we will also explore approaches to analyzing post-socialist media systems and media systems beyond Western-centric perspectives.

- Analyze the functioning of media and media systems by comparing the relationship between media and the state/political sphere in totalitarian, authoritarian, and democratic media systems, and distinguish between the liberal, democratic corporatist, and polarized pluralist models of media systems

Course Description

The primary aim of this course is to provide students with a comprehensive understanding of the history, development, influence, and future outlook of the radio medium. The course situates radio within a broader socio-historical context by examining its historical evolution, legal and regulatory frameworks (ownership and legislation), political influence, and communicological implications, particularly the societal impact of radio's emergence.

The development of radio broadcasting is analyzed through a comparative approach, focusing on the American and European models of radio systems. Special emphasis is placed on the establishment and growth of Radio Zagreb, the first electronic medium in Croatia, and the broader trajectory of Croatian radio broadcasting throughout the 20th century.

Students will be introduced to the current structure and dynamics of the radio sector, including the distinction between public service and commercial broadcasters, types of broadcasting licenses, programming strategies, and methods of signal distribution. Through field visits and a guest lecture delivered by a recognized expert in the field of radio, students will gain insight into the characteristics of contemporary convergent radio (such as DAB+ radio, streaming services, mobile applications, websites, digital platform presence, podcasts, and storytelling formats).

Furthermore, the course seeks to acquaint students with the operations of Radio Student. By combining theoretical knowledge with the development of practical skills through seminar-based instruction, the course aims to motivate and prepare students for active participation in radio program production in the forthcoming period.







Course Description

We have entered the urban age - most of the world population now lives in cities, which means we live in spaces managed and negotiated via the use of an array of communication technologies and practices.

In what is a rapidly growing field in media and cultural studies, the concoction "media city" cannot satisfactorily examine the dual object of its study from a single perspective (neither urban studies nor media studies alone), but requires select inputs from a range of disciplines (politics, media studies, urban studies, human geography, sociology of everyday life, sociology of media consumption, cultural studies, and architecture). Adopting this inter-disciplinary frame, in this course we examine how contemporary urban spaces manifest themselves as "mediated cities", and why it is useful to understand a wide array of media and communications in their formative urban context, such as:

- reading city spaces (plans, layouts, street furniture, monuments) as symbol and text;
- understanding urban infrastructures such as squares as media (and vice-versa):
- the rise of transnational cultures and social disparities in global cities;
- urban and suburban media cultures: newspapers, cinema, radio, television and the mobile phone;
- changing spaces and practices of urban consumption (the storefront, the mall);
- the mediation of the neighbourhood, community and diaspora;
- the centrality of politics and culture to urban regeneration;
- communicative responses to urban crises such as racism, poverty and pollution;
- the role of street art, graffiti and performance in the negotiation of 'the right to the city';

Grading

Students are required to attend one-hour lectures, followed by one-hour small group seminars (the student qualifies for the examination by having between not more than four absences), and, in preparation for the seminar, to read the text(s) set for each weeks session (available in advance through the library and online learning resources) and to think of ways of engaging with those texts with reference to empirical cases of their choice, so as to discuss and examine the pertinent issues. In all aspects of work on this course, students will be encouraged to act creatively and critically in reflecting on the postmodern urban spaces they inhabit, drawing on arts, graffiti, films, music, public events, and other particular forms of mediations. Students will be obliged to prepare, in advance of each weeks session, individual and/or group presentations of weekly readings thinking through the main points, as well as examples useful in an examination of the text. Students are invited to refer to cases identified in (as well as own produced work in,



- city competition and urban branding;
- outdoor advertising;
- changing forms of urban experience: indifference, encounter, flaneuring, street life;
- moving image architecture;
- the transformation of private/public as well as global/local in the contemporary city;
- 'smart'/cyber urbanism;
- the emergence of Media City production spaces and clusters.

You will gain access to some useful intellectual tools for understanding mediated urban life and you will develop an informed and critical understanding of what it means to live in the contemporary city. You will be expected to investigate mediated urban living creatively and critically, through a range of cross-disciplinary association, combined and unconventional methodology (paying attention to historical links and materiality of communication) as well as developing your own interest in the more specific issues and phenomena.

where appropriate and applicable) photography, film, and everyday urban spaces. Students will be encouraged to embark on their own explorations of the city, its spaces, objects, and mediations, to critically reflect on their experiences of everyday life in a technologically mediated city, and to seek out most useful ways of understanding and researching issues arising from those explorations. In the middle of the term students will be asked to submit a 2000 word long coursework, on a case of urban mediation of their own choice, with reference to one of the approaches covered in the course so far. Students are encouraged to do so, especially because they will be allowed to use the same material in their final examined work, and can thus seek appropriate feedback well in advance of the final deadline. The examined essay should be written in an intelligible academic English and in an engaging way (intellectually, empirically and conceptually), in 4-5000 words (bibliography included). The examined essay questions will be supplied during the term. Students will have plenty of opportunity to prepare for the examination, by attending individual tutorials with the course leader and interacting with one another in extra sessions like urban walks (see below).





Course Description

The course "New authoritarian systems: Russia and post-Soviet space" icovers politics, political systems and societies of all countries that emerged on the territory of the former USSR, except the three Baltic republics. The aim of the course is to teach students of undergraduate programme in political science about contemporary forms of autocratic systems that are direct product of historical heritage and political processes taking place in the new independent states after the collapse of the USSR. The transition from communism has not resulted in the emergence of new democratic systems but in the emergence of pseudodemocracy or usually some new form of autocratic systems that are resistant to democratization process. Through lectures and seminars it will be explained to students the historical legacy that preceded the establishment of the new independent states, the mode and the contextual framework in which began the transition from communism, the selection of new political institutions, political processes and political culture in these countries. Empirical data that will be used in classes will be explained and analyzed through theoretical concepts of democratic transition, autocratic systems and political subsystems: system of government, electoral system and party system.

Preliminary exams are taken through written and oral knowledge tests.

Course Description

The objective of the course is to acquaint the student with the interaction of Jews and Arabs in the Middle East from the time of the First Aliyah (Jewish immigration to Palestine) and the birth of Zionism as organized political movement until today. Arab-Jewish relations will be discussed within different political contexts: late Ottoman Period, Mandate Period, State of Israel 1948-1967, State of Israel from 1967-1993, and State of Israel 1993 – present. Though focus is on the Eretz Israel, other Middle Eastern countries with Jewish presence prior to creation of Jewish State will be discussed, in particular Jordan, Syria, Lebanon, Iraq and Egypt. The course will address interaction between Jews and Arabs in broad variety: from peaceful coexistence to different forms of collision and conflict. The course is interdisciplinary in its approach. Political processes will be analyzed inter alia from the aspects of history, theology, nationalism, economy, ideology, and security.







The aim of the course is to introduce students to the fundamental categories, analytical models and research that have developed over the past two decades within the field of comparative politics that focuses on political parties—their emergence, development and functioning. Political parties are primarily approached as organizations that mediate between the state and society, voters and government and that form the basic elements of the system of democratic competition, participation, and representation.

Course Description

The title of the course "Political science fiction" is a wordplay: it means merging political science with fiction, or politics with science fiction. Science fiction provides the story or us, not predominantly or necessarily about outer space or distant future. Hence, science fiction can be seen as an allegory of ourselves and the opportunity to explore our political practices and society. The advantage of studying fiction along with social sciences, especially with politics, is the fact that fiction raises new ideas about politics that cannot be found in the mainstream social science literature. The creativity of thought found in science fiction thus helps us thinking about major politicalphilosophical problems we are always confronted with. The aim of this course is to examine some of the major topics in political science through the vehicle of (science) fiction narratives. We will provide these narratives with political aura giving them theoretical underpinnings. From its beginnings it is believed that science fiction represents a rich subtext for our historical and current political struggles. It deals with central political and social issues regarding our views on life in general and communal life with others, on threats to our way of life, on crossing the boundaries of traditions and existing social practices, on our enemies and human nature, on political and ethical disputes, ideal institutions, or utopian and dystopian political communities and organizations. Thus, science fiction contributes toward better understanding of political life. It is a divergent way of approaching to the grand themes of political science and social life in general. By merging politics and science fiction together this course will add to the traditional cannon of courses in political science, hence providing with the opportunity for learning about politics from the perspective of science fiction as an important part of our popular culture. Since science fiction provides a commentary on social and political evolution, it necessary resonates with current or potential problems and debates of this world. Sometimes science fiction is a product of both trans-epochal and current social problems and concerns. But our political ideals may be influenced by some idealized fictional views of the future. Hence, this course is designed to enliven a greater understanding of the seriousness of such views and debates by demanding from students to challenge their view on the genre, namely to see beyond the entertaining dimension of science fiction, but rather into its political and social potential for critique of our societies, institutions, dangers and development. As such, it is a course about politics and political thought, not (science) fiction as such. Since the relevance of political-philosophical arguments in fiction should not be explored exclusively in the genre of sci-fi media, the course is a platform to explore the politics through film in general. In doing so, we will focus on different sources - from the politicalphilosophical texts to those that explore the matter in question through the lenses of international relations, comparative politics and public policy - asking from the students the ability to think in different directions.

Course Description

The course "Political Systems of Central European and the Baltic Countries" includes political systems, politics and societies of six postcommunist Central European countries - Poland, the Czech Republic, Slovakia, Hungary, Slovenia and Croatia - and three post-Soviet Baltic states - Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania. The aim of the course is to introduce students of undergraduate studies of political science and journalism with systems, actors and processes in the new European democracies that successfully finished transition after the fall of communist systems in Eastern Europe. This makes the main difference that separates those countries from the regime's "gray zone" that exists in most post-Soviet states where democratization has failed or has never even begun. Through lectures and seminars students will get knowledge about the historical legacy that preceded the establishment of new political systems in Central Europe and the Baltic, the way and contextual framework in which democratic transition began, the selection of new political institutions, the political processes and political culture in those countries. Empirical data that will be used in teaching will be analyzed through theoretical concepts of democratic transition, democratic systems and specific political subsystems: the system of government, the electoral system and the party system.

Course Description

This course is about political and social processes in Southeast Europe, defined in a wider sense which includes Turkey, Greece, Albania and post-Yugoslav states. 

Course Description

The aim of the course is an introductory study of public finances in combination with what it is in the discipline of political science called the politics of the budgetary process. It is, in fact, the case that one side of the course belongs to the economic science - since the public finance are in a group of financial discipline, such as monetary finance, international finance, corporate finance, financial institutions and markets. On the other hand, the subject of the course is regularly encountered in the study of political science, where, besides called public finances, appears as the politics of the budgetary process, politics of budget policy, budgeting policy, the policy of the public sector and the like. Regardless of the name under which it is carried out it is a case that deals with their activities related to the acquisition of public revenues and execution of public expenditures.

The course consists of the two main parts: 1. The policy of the budget process and public choice; 2. Taxes, public expenditure and fiscal policy. The first section begins with an introductory part, as a kind of plea for the public finances, where a brief discussion of the importance of the study of public finances, and about the role of the public sector and public goods in modern democratic societies. Followed by the fundamental features of the budget process and budget management, a brief overview of budgeting techniques, and political science contributions to the study of the budget process. The latter issue affects the aspect of studying the budgetary process developed by political scientists like Aaron Wildavskog and other prominent scientists of that discipline. Special attention is paid to the role of the legislature in a complex game of determining the size and structure of the budget. The following review of the basic concepts of the theory of public choice, related primarily to the role of public goods and the role of the government in modern economies. Especially considering the question includes government activities in the economy, i.e., the size of the public sector and the tendency of its growth or reduction. In this way, the course stresses the importance of the political economy of collective decision-making for understanding the role of public finance in contemporary democracies. At the end of the first unit deals with different aspects of the financing of local and regional government, and exposing the theory of fiscal federalism and various aspects of the decentralization policies. The above mentioned topics and teaching units also make the material of the first colloquium.

The second part of the course begins by considering the fiscal revenues. First, the fundamental objectives of the taxation and the tax classification to then briefly discuss the basic types of taxes, especially in Croatia. The course is considered besides the basic features of the tax systems of other countries and their importance for the development of the public sector in the developed democracies. This is followed by consideration of public expenditure. First, consider the basic types of public expenditure, given the economic and functional classification. Then consider pension systems in Croatia and other countries, financing of the health sector and related policies to prevent unemployment. The last unit deals with the question of financing the borrowing of governments, with a particular focus on the size and structure of the public debt. These themes include material of the second colloquium.

The first discusses the basic issues of the budgetary process and budgeting, including the issue of public goods and the political economy of the public sector. In the second part of the course lectures are concerned with the basic kinds of taxes and modern tax system. This is followed by lectures on basic types of public spending (pensions, health care, employment, education). At the end of the second part deals with questions of government borrowing and public debt.

» It is the responsibility of each student to attend classes regularly, especially seminars. During the semester, each student is obliged to make two brief memos(2-3 pages of a text) on a given literature according to a weekly schedule of classes. Stude selects at least one of the sources of literature provided for a particularly weekly meeting and writing about it brief memo. By submitting two memos and regular attendance of seminars (not to be absent more than 3 times during the semester), student is fulfilling the conditions to obtain the signature of the course professor.

The work in the seminar takes place within one seminar group. Seminars examines the theoretical and technical literature relevant for the public finances as a scientific discipline and is organized as a research seminar on fiscal and taxation issues. In seminar are aditionally, in detail, discussed the topics presented at lectures in order to prepare students for the final exam. In addition to writing two memos within the seminar students are referred to

Course Description

The aim of the course is an introductory study of public policy, with particular emphasis in understanding of the basic approaches in their study, without a detailed presentation of specific public policies. The curriculum aims to give students a basic knowledge of who creates public policy, where they form, what they are and in what kind of relation to alternatives such as public management (governance) and public administration (Public Management).

The fundamental starting point of the course is related to the fact that different levels of government - national, regional or local, in an effort to respond to different types of economic, social and political problems, develop specific policies. They in fact used the laws and other forms of regulation, budget expenditures, taxation and various types of public action and decision. This process is in Croatian political science discourse for many years indicates the phrase "javne politike" (public policy), which means the process of creating a policy for the community in different sector areas. Depending on the context, sometimes used terms and state policy, urban policy and the like. The course deals with, in fact, the basic segments of the policy-making: the actors, instruments and objectives, and the whole process of their formulation, legitimization, implementation and evaluation (the first part of the course, meetings 1-6). The second part of the course gives an introduction to the fundamental approaches to public policy, with a view of conceptual and theoretical-methodological questions of standard literature on public policy as a scientific discipline (the second part of the course, meetings 8-12).

The second part of lectures, covering second colloquium, relates to the basic approaches in studying public policy.

» Additional points students can win by writing two memos (2-3 pages) and their presentation in the seminar. Submissions of the memmos should be written on the basis of important theoretical and methodological articles published in English, listed with each event, except the last topics. Writing individual submission students can collect up to 2 points, so that the maximum number of points that can achieve this kind of activity are 4 points. Submissions are sent via e-mail to the course teachers who lead the seminar group at the latest by two days before the course at 8 am (late submissions will not be accepted). Submission on a particular subject are written only after those topics covered in the lecture, which means a week after the lecture. Points collected at the seminar added to the total sum of the points awarded for the colloquiums or the entire written examination after the student formed a positive final grade. In other words, the seminar points do not constitute the basis for the conversion of negative final marks in the positive.

The second part of seminars relating to liabilities under which students receive a confirmation (a signature) that they were actively participated in the course. Apart from the regularity in arriving at the seminar classes (a maximum of 3 absence) students are required to make two submissions on policy proposals which are available in the Croatian language. Each seminar groups will be further divided into subgroups A, B, C, D and E, which will consist of 6-8 students. Each student will be required twice during the semester to prepare a short presentation

on a proposed public policy. Group A will have such an obligation in the first and sixth week of seminars, group B in the 2nd and the 7th week and so on.

Selected public policies are analyzed in detail within the seminar, by pointing out the context of their design in Croatia and other European countries, with the aim of informing students with the main outputs and outcomes of these policies. Some colloquium can bring up to 15 points, and the entire written examination may bring a maximum of 30 points. Seminars delivers maximum of additional 4 points. Points from all forms of testing knowledge on the course are counted, so the total sum of the points two colloquia or all of the written exam and seminar classes may amount to a total of 34 points. The exam can be taken by tests only if they pass the first and second colloquium! Course Description

The aim of the course is to provide an introductory examination of public policy, focusing on its understanding and on familiarizing students with the main approaches to its study, without engaging in detailed analyses of specific policy areas. The curriculum seeks to equip students with foundational knowledge about who formulates public policies, where they are made, what purposes they serve, and how they relate to alternative frameworks such as governance or public administration (public management).

The course is based on the premise that various levels of government, including national, regional, and local authorities, develop specific policies in their efforts to respond to different types of economic, social, and political challenges. In doing so, they employ laws and other forms of regulation, budgetary expenditures, taxation, and various instruments of public action and decision-making. In Croatian political science discourse, this process has for many years been referred to by the term public policy, denoting the process of formulating policies for the community across different sectoral domains. Depending on the context, terms such as state policy or municipal policy are also occasionally used.


Within the scope of the course, the fundamental components of public policy-making are examined, including actors, instruments, and objectives, as well as the overall process of their formulation, legitimation, implementation, and evaluation.

In addition, the course introduces the principal approaches to the study of public policy, presenting key conceptual and theoretical-methodological issues as reflected in the standard literature of public policy as a scientific discipline.





Course Description

A main purpose of the course is to equip students with skills to approach study of the Middle East with methods of research focused on distinctive cultural, social and political features of the Orient.

This graduate course is focused on politics, religion and history of the Middle East, and the sources for their study. Inasmuch as most students attending this course have never studied Middle East, course starts with introduction to basic information about it. (No previous knowledge about Middle East is expected from students enrolling to this course).

There are several aspects in which Middle East differs from Europe and the West. One of those aspects is significant role of religion and irrational thinking in defining political positions and creating political programs. Another is role of history - particularly if history is perceived as containing divine revelation - in finding political patterns and parallels in modernity. Religion and the past are among the main sources of identity and loyalty in many Middle Eastern societies. Transmission of their importance into politics is not an unexpected phenomenon, and yet it has often been overlooked and neglected in many European and Western analyses of the Middle East. This has been done partially due to want of methodological tools to examine it. context, importance of an interdisciplinary multidisciplinary approach ad hoc designed for study of Oriental societies cannot be overrated. This course has been designed to investigate correlation of different academic disciplines in Oriental studies, primarily Political Science, Theology, History, Linguistics and Law. For the purpose of following those processes, sample historical and current events will be discussed.

Students will also be introduced to some basic Hebrew and Arabic terms, necessary to understand current Middle Eastern Processes. Emphasis is on terminology relevant for studying politics of the Middle East, which cannot be translated into English without due explanation, such as Hitnahalut, Asabiyah, Caliphate, Fitnah, etc.

Invoking religion, and even history as a theological concept, in creating politics, is not unknown in the West. However, it has not been a dominant feature of Western politics for decades or even centuries. To study politics in the current Middle East, one ought to recognize its particularities, i.e. when it is similar and when it differs from Western politics, policymaking and legislation. Shift from a typical Western-oriented pattern of thinking, towards examination determined by features of the object of analysis is necessary to achieve such a goal. In the process, the student will gain insight into specific features and premises of different civilizations, which compels diverse approach in the study of various civilizations. The course will also raise awareness of Occidental-centeredness which often taints Western analyses of non-Western countries, societies, political cultures, religions and civilizations.

The aim of the course is to introduce students to the theoretical features and practical methods of creating short journalistic forms within the context of media platforms that have shaped and transformed them. Special emphasis is placed on their informative-persuasive function, argumentative structure, style, and impact on audiences in the digital environment.
