Course description and course objectives:	Television Newroom /Televizijska redakcija 5 ECTS Television Newsroom is a practical course for the students who have already attended at least one practical course on media production, online media, tv, radio, mobile journalism, multimedia journalism or film production and are interested to broaden knowledge on television reporting. The students are asked to achieve the objective through practice. Students will have the excercises in filming and editing before starting planning their own project. The course aims at developing students' knowledge in television programme production and paralelly to understand what has changed in the broadcasting world. Within the course, students will have a practical exercise in preparing the story (writing a treatment), filming a story, writing the script and editing. Students will work in teams, help each other in producing stories, exchange roles. At the end of the course, one student should produce at least two stories (at least one as a journalist) together with the online versions. During the semester, students will also prepare and produce a short tv studio interview (for the Erasmus Guide) ad they will go through the complete process of television production from planning to studio production.
